

2016 Statistics on Social Work Education in the United States

A summary of the CSWE Annual Survey of Social Work Programs



The Annual Survey of Social Work Programs (Annual Survey) is a census of social work programs in the United States and its territories conducted by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) since 1952. Data collected in the Annual Survey are the primary source of information about social work students, graduates, and faculty members. In addition to advancing knowledge about social work education, the data are used to determine program membership dues for accredited baccalaureate and master's programs.

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The 2016 Annual Survey was composed of five survey sections that gathered data on faculty members and on baccalaureate, master's, practice doctorate (e.g., DSW), and research doctorate programs (PhD). The faculty section collected information about academic rank, professional education, and demographics of full-time and part-time faculty members; it also requested information about administrative titles and tenure status of full-time faculty members. The program sections included items on program structure and offerings, enrollments, and degrees awarded.

The survey was administered online through the Zarca Interactive survey platform. On November 11, 2016, invitations to the survey were e-mailed to all CSWE-accredited social work programs and to doctoral social work programs housed at institutions with CSWE-accredited social work programs (see Table 1). The 2016 Annual Survey closed in March 2017.

When reporting the number of individuals from historically underrepresented groups, the categories of African American/Other Black, Chicano/Mexican American, Puerto Rican, Other Latino/Hispanic, American Indian/Native American, Asian American/Other Asian, Pacific Islander, Other, and Multiple Race/Ethnicity are used.

Participation Rate and Limitations

Changes in items, wording, and response options alter each year's survey instruments. Programs are not required to respond to most survey items. In the baccalaureate and master's programs survey sections, programs were required to respond only to the questions about total number of degrees awarded, URL address of posted assessment outcomes, and year of posting of assessment outcomes. In the faculty survey section and the practice doctorate and PhD program survey sections, programs were not required to respond to any questions. Researchers should exercise caution in data comparisons across survey year, program level, and survey item.

Baccalaureate Programs

There were 510 baccalaureate programs at the time of the survey, and 499 participated (97.8%). Programs reported a total enrollment of 63,530 enrolled students, with the majority of those being enrolled full-time (56,448; 88.9% of enrolled). Programs averaged 119 full-time enrolled and 18.7 part-time students. Less than half the baccalaureate programs offer a part-time program (220 programs; 44.3%).

The majority of full-time BSW students were female, under the age of 25, and White (non-Hispanic). Full-time students from historically underrepresented groups comprised 44.6% (25,186) of the full-time enrollment and 44.9% (28,528) of total enrollment.

Part-time students, like full-time students, were predominantly White and female. However, part-time students were slightly older—ages 25–34 (30%). These patterns are similar to BSW part-time programs in 2015. As in 2015, part-time programs had a greater proportion of students from historically underrepresented groups (47.2%; 3,342) than did full-time programs.





Programs reported a total of 20,348 degrees awarded in the 2015–2016 academic year. The majority of graduates were female, between the ages of 20–24, and White (non-Hispanic). Slightly more than 39% (39.1%; 7,946) of the graduates were from historically underrepresented groups.

Texas had the highest number of BSW graduates (1,285), followed by Michigan (1,250), and New York (1,117)

Master's Programs

There were 250 accredited master's of social work programs at the time of the survey; 239 participated in the survey, giving a 95.6% response rate. Programs reported a total enrollment of 64,486 enrolled students with the majority of those being enrolled full-time (41,440; 64.3% of enrolled), though the split between full-time and part-time is more even than at the BSW level. Programs averaged 186.7 full-time enrolled and 112.4 part-time students.

Full-time master's students were predominantly female (85.0%) and White (non-Hispanic) (54.5%). In age, 40.9% (16,967) are 25-34 years old. Full-time students from historically underrepresented groups comprised 39.4% (16,339) of the total enrollment.

Most master's programs offer a part-time program (210 programs; 89.0%). Part-time students, like full-time students, are predominantly female (83.6%; 19,260). However, part-time students are slightly older—ages 25–34 (47.6%), and part-time programs had a greater proportion of students from historically underrepresented groups (44.9%; 10,338) than did full-time programs.

The top five MSW certificates offered in 2016 were Gerontology (52), School Social Work (49), Addictions (25), Child Welfare (24), and Nonprofit Management (17). These were the same as the top five certificates in 2015.


In 2016 the most popular field education practicum was Community Mental Health or Mental Health (7,022). Other popular field education practicums were Health/Integrative Health and Mental Health (6,154), School Social Work (4,823), Child Welfare (3,752), and Family Services (3,227).

Programs were asked to identify the methods and field of practice specializations offered. Clinical or Direct Practice was the most frequently offered methods specialization (110), with the highest enrollment rate of 19,388 in 2016. The second most-offered methods specialization was Advanced Generalist (65), followed by Administration (31), and Community Development, Organization, or Planning (30).

Number of Programs Offering Methods Specializations




Number of Programs Offering Fields of Practice Specializations




The most frequently offered field of practice specialization in 2016 was Children, Youths, and Families (75), with an enrollment rate of 4,166.

Programs reported a total of 27,659 degrees awarded in the 2015–2016 academic year. The majority of graduates were female (79.7%), ages 25–34 (45.2%), and White (51.6%). The proportion of graduates identifying with a historically underrepresented group was 36.1% (9,980). There were 6,949 advanced standing MSW degrees. There were also 402 international graduates.




New York (3,877), California (3,219), Illinois (1,613), and Texas (1,512) had the most graduates. A full table of master's program degrees and enrollment by state can be found in the report Appendix.

Practice Doctorate Programs

There were 11 practice doctorate social work programs at the time of the survey; all 11 participated in the survey for a 100% response rate. Programs reported a total enrollment of 611 students, with the majority of those being enrolled full-time (412; 67.4% of enrolled). Programs had an average of 24.2 full-time enrolled and 11.1 part-time students. Less than half the practice doctorate programs (45.5%) offer a part-time program.

The number of practice doctorate programs has been growing. The master's program survey asked whether practice doctorate programs were projected; plans to launch two such programs by the next academic year and 15 within the next 2 academic years were reported. Of those programs still in planning stages, most (9; 52.9%) are planning a clinical focus, three a general focus, two a teaching focus, one an administrative focus, and two have unspecified focuses.



The majority of enrolled practice doctorate students were female (78.4%); 35.4% (216) were age 45 years or older. Students from historically underrepresented groups comprised 47.8% (292) of the total enrollment. It should be noted that a single program accounted for half the enrolled students from historically underrepresented groups and 58.5% of all African American/Other Black enrolled students.

There was a reported total of 56 degrees awarded from four programs in the 2015–2016 academic year. Given that most students finish the doctorate in 3 years, we expect the number of graduates to triple in 2–3 years as the newer programs begin to graduate their first cohorts. The majority of graduates were female (64.3%), aged 45 years or older (37.5%), and White (48.2%). The proportion of graduates identifying with a historically underrepresented group was 30.4% (17).

Programs also were asked about time to degree and employment of the practice doctorate graduates. Most graduates finished the practice doctorate in 3 years or less (77%) and 86% within 4 years.



There is a marked contrast between employment reported for PhD graduates and that of advanced practice doctorate graduates, with more than half the PhD graduates taking faculty or academic research positions compared to 33.9% of advanced practice graduates. Practice doctorate programs reporting details on the Other position mentioned clinical positions in trauma-informed practice and work with children and youths. Programs also mentioned positions with federal agencies.

Research Doctorate Programs

There were 77 research doctorate social work programs at the time of the survey; 75 participated in the survey, for a 97.4% response rate. Programs reported a total enrollment of 2,325 students, with the majority of those being enrolled full-time (1,778; 76.5% of enrolled). Programs had an average of 23.7 full-time enrolled and 7.3 part-time enrolled students. Less than half the research doctorate programs (45.9%, 34) offered a part-time program.

Research Doctorate Enrollment by Year




Most enrolled research doctorate students were female (73.9%); 38.6% (897) were 25–34 years old. Students from historically underrepresented groups comprised 44.9% (1,043) of the total enrollment.

aged 35–44 years old. The proportion of graduates identifying with a historically underrepresented group was 42.4% (140).

Programs were asked about time to degree for graduates and employment of graduates. Most students graduate within 4–6 years: 23.4% in 5 years (77), 18.8% in 6 years (62), and 16.7% in 4 years (55). A minority of students took 10 years or more to graduate (8.8%; 29). Most graduates were employed in academic faculty, research, or administrative positions (68.8%; 271).





Social Work Faculty

The Annual Survey of Social Work Programs collects aggregate data about full-time and part-time faculty members. Previously, individualized information was collected about each faculty member; programs filled out a separate form for each faculty member every year. In 2011 the process changed to collect aggregate information about full-time and part-time faculty members. The shift has led to a dramatic increase in response rate. Beginning with the 2012 Annual Survey, CSWE definitions of full-time and part-time faculty members were dropped; institutions were asked to self-define their full-time and part-time/contract faculty members.

The largest proportion of full-time faculty members was in the age range of 45–54 years (25.0%), followed by faculty members in the age range of 55–64 years (23.9%). Most of the full-time faculty members were female (71.7%; 4,151). Faculty members from historically underrepresented groups accounted for 32.6% (1,886) of full-time faculty members. Compared with full-time faculty members,





part-time/contract faculty members tended to be younger, and a smaller proportion (28.5%; 2,196) was from historically underrepresented groups.

The largest proportion of full-time faculty held the rank of assistant professor (26.4%; 1,612), followed by associate professor and professor. Programs reported 1,893 faculty members with administrative titles. The most commonly held title was director of field education (23.0%; 434), followed by director of BSW program (17.5%; 332).

Programs also were asked about the tenure status of full-time faculty members; 42.5% (2,389) were tenured, and 24.8% (1,393) were on tenure track.
